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JOHN BARBOUR, D.D., LITT.D.,

Son of James and Elizabeth Graham (Foster)' Barbour, was born July 12, 1849, in Danville, Ky. He made a public confession of his faith in the First Presbyterian Church of Maysville, Ky., at the age of thirteen. His preparatory studies were pursued in the Rand and Richeson Academy of Maysville, Ky., and he graduated from Centre College in 1871. After this he spent a year with a surveying party, a year at a law school in Louisville, Ky., and two years as general bookkeeper in the First National Bank of Ironton, Ohio. He entered the Seminary at Princeton in 1875, taking the full three years' course there, and graduating in 1878. He was licensed, May 5, 1877, by the Presbytery of Ebenezer, and ordained, April 26, 1879, by the same Presbytery. From 1878 to 1879 he engaged in home missionary work in Greenup, Ky. He was pastor of the Twenty-second Street Church of Louisville, Ky., from December 1879 to November 1881. He served the church of Paxton, Ill., as pastor elect, from January 1882 to May 1884; was pastor of the church of Bement, Ill., from May 1884 to June 1888; pastor of the church of Mankato, Minn., from June 1888 to March 1893; pastor of the South Highlands' Church of Birmingham, Ala., from March 1893 to April 1898; pastor of the church of Maysville, Ky., from May 1899 to 1925, and stated supply of the church of Prestonsburg, Ky., from 1926 until his death. He died November 14, 1929, in Pikeville, Ky., of pneumonia in the 81st year of his age. He was buried in the Cemetery of Maysville, Ky. He received the degree of D.D. from Central University in 1896, and the degree of Litt.D. from Centre College in 1919. He was moderator of the Presbyteries of Louisville, Blommington, and Mankato, and also of the Presbytery of North Alabama of the Southern Presbyterian Church. He was moderator of the Synod of Minnesota in 1892 and of the Synod of Kentucky in 1904. He

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was a delegate to the Glasgow meeting of the Pan-Presbyterian Council in 1896. He published: "Ministers and Music," being lectures he delivered to the Princeton Seminary students. He was a trustee of Centre College as were his father and grandfather before him. He was honorary director and member of the Examining Committee of McCormick Theological Seminary.

He was married August 2, 1883, in Louisville, Ky., to Mildred Richeson Phillips, who died May 27, 1924. One son and one daughter survive him.

BENNINGTON FITZ RANDOLPH CLARK, M.D.,

Son of James and Sarah Ann G. (Fitz Randolph) Clark, was born October 13, 1852, in Louisburg, Pa. He made a public confession of his faith in the Spring Garden Presbyterian Church of Philadelphia, at the age of twelve. His preparatory studies were pursued privately in Philadelphia, and he was a member of the class of 1872 of the University of Pennsylvania. After leaving the University, he spent three years as an accountant in the employ of a railroad company. He entered the Seminary at Princeton in 1875, taking the full three years' course there, and graduating in 1878. He was licensed, May 6, 1878, by the Presbytery of Philadelphia. He was never ordained. He studied medicine in the University of Pennsylvania, receiving the degree of M.D. in 1894. He was a teacher in the Philadelphia Polyclinic, 1894-1911. He resided in Palmerton, Pa., 1911-24, and in Atlantic City, N. J., from 1924 until his death there, September 3, 1928, of heart disease in the 76th year of his age. He was buried in the Woodlands Cemetery of Philadelphia. He wrote many medical articles for various magazines.

He was married September 29, 1897, in Philadelphia, Pa.,
