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**DAVID J\* BEALE, D.D.,**

Son of Joshua and Milly (Milliken) Beale, was born July 1, 1835, in Bealetown, Pa. He made a public profession of his faith in the Middle Tuscarora Presbyterian Church at the age of seventeen. His preparatory studies were pursued in the Tuscarora and Airy View academies and he graduated from Jefferson (now Washington and Jefferson) College in 1861. He began his theological studies in the Western Theological Seminary at Allegheny, Pa., being there from September, 1861, to January, 1862, when he moved to Princeton, entering the Seminary there, and remaining somewhat more than two years. He was licensed by the Presbytery of Huntingdon, April 16, 1863, and ordained by the same, Aug. 11, 1864, being at the same time installed pastor of the church at Middle Tuscarora, Pa., which he had been serving as supply since his licensure. He was released from this charge Dec. 22, 1868. His further pastorates were over the following churches: St. George's, Del., June 1, 1869, to Jan. 17, 1872; Light Street Church, Baltimore, Md., May 2, 1872, to Sept. 3, 1883; Johnstown, Pa., Oct. 10, 1883, to Sept. 16, 1890; Frederick City, Md., Nov. 4, 1891, to July 17, 1896, and the First Church of Northern Liberties, Philadelphia, Pa., Oct. 26, 1896, to Oct. 3, 1898. He was then engaged in evangelistic work, as occasion offered, residing in Philadelphia, until his death there, Oct. 19, 1900, of angina pectoris, after an illness of only three days, in the 66th year of his age. He was buried in the Presbyterian Cemetery of Mifflintown, Pa. He received the degree of D.D. from Washington and Jefferson College in 1886. Dr. Beale was a commissioner to the General Assembly at Pittsburgh, 1877. He was a member of the American Academy of Political and Social Science. He published "The History of the Tuscarora Valley," 1869; "Sketches of the Jefferson College Class of 1861," 1886; "Life and Labors of Professor David Wilson," and "Through the Johnstown Flood," 1890, beside a number of sermons. His pastorate at Johnstown was signalized by

the great and disastrous flood which overwhelmed that place, in connection with which he distinguished himself by his heroic labors, becoming known throughout the entire land.

He was married May 2, 1865, in Bellefonte, Pa., to Miss Mary Riddle Moore, who with three sons and three daughters survives him. One of his sons is a member of the senior class of Princeton Seminary.

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### GEORGE WARRINGTON,

Son of George and Mary (Evaul) Warrington, was born Dec. 13, 1842, in Dover, Del. His preparatory studies were pursued in the Friends Central High School, Philadelphia, and under private tuition, and he graduated from Amherst College in 1862. After his graduation he taught for one year in the Friends Central High School, Philadelphia; was for two months, July and August, 1863, in the Gettysburg campaign with the militia, being discharged on account of a wound received in the battle of Chester; for the next three months was a clerk in the commissary department, Washington, D. C. In November, 1863, he entered the army again and was 1st lieutenant of the 8th U. S. cavalry troop. He received a severe wound in the campaign in Florida in February, 1864, and was discharged the following October. After this he engaged in teaching and in the study of law in Trenton, N. J., with the Hon. Edward W. Scudder, LL.D., a trustee of the Seminary. It was at this time that he made a public profession of his faith in the First Presbyterian Church of Trenton, at the age of twenty-two, and was led to devote himself to the work of the ministry. He entered the Seminary at Princeton in 1867, taking the full three years' course and graduated in 1870. He returned to the Seminary for a fourth year. He was licensed by the Presbytery of New Brunswick, April 14, 1869, and ordained by the Presbytery of West Jersey, May 9, 1871, being at the same time installed pastor of the church at Glassboro, N. J. This relation was dissolved Dec. 28 of the same year. He combined with this pastorate the supply of the neighboring Bunker Hill Church. He was stated supply of the Berlin, Atco and Waterford churches,
