MR. CLAXTON'S APPEAL

In his appeal, printed in Current Notes and Opinions of this issue of The Christian Statesman, Hon. P. P. Claxton, head of the federal bureau of education, asks for a liberal support of the public schools. He calls upon legislatures, boards of education and other organizations to aid in the work.

We are glad to give space to his communication. The public schools of today are forming the citizenship of tomorrow. We cannot neglect or mislead without a deep injury to the nation's life.

And we are glad to endorse, unreservedly, the appeal as far as it goes.
