What ever I may have said at any time, on the exciting topics of the day. No man, no truth, can say that I have said aught against you, either as a citizen, a soldier, a patriot or Christian. I challenge all men, to produce the expression.

And you do me injustice to harbour a contrary opinion of me, on the authority of any stranger who strikes with the dagger concealed.
