1 P. Mederor efinition of Christianity --

Christianity is a revelation of God through Jesus Christ whereby reconciliation and a new spiritual life in fellowship with Himself are brought to mankind.

Christ is the final and supreme authority for Christianity In fact, Jesus Christ is the final authority on all matters pertaining to the Christian religion. According to the New Testament, Christianity in its essential character is a distinct revelation of God, and in and through Jesus Christ. Christianit reveals to men not only the mame of God, but the nature of God which is love, and the character of God, which is perfect Christianity, is the highest known conception of God. Christianity places the greatest valuation on man. Jesus Christ set such high value on man's soul that He died for it.

The late Dr. John McDowell says Christianity offers the only solution of the world's three unsolved problems—the problem of sin, the problem of suffering, and the problem of sorrow. To each of these problems the Christian message

gives a definit and satisfying answer. Its answer to the problem of sin is forgiveness through Jesus Christ. Its answer to the problem of suffering is that suffering is discipline for the sake of character. Its answer to the problem of sorrow is the assurance of the Divine Comforter. He says further that Christianity makes known to men the best uses of life. Life, in Christianity, is not an end in itself; it is a means to an end, and the end is the glory of God through saving and serving men. Sacrifice and

Christianity calls for oneness of believers with Christ, and oneness of believers themselves. Another of its essentials is faith in the promise of Christ --"Lo I am with you always even unto the end of the world; faith in the power of the Holy Spirit in the hearts of men and women who will open their hearts to Him; faith in the constraining power of the love of Christ."

As one has said, "it is the Christian faith that it is the purpose of God that the spirit

of Jesus Christ is the norm for our lives." We should, therefore endeavor by the enabling grace of God to approach life's problems under the guidance of the spirit of Christ, first asking ourselves--What would Jesus do in a similar situation.

In the 1 John 3:24 Christianity is defined in terms of the Spirit. "And he that keepeth His commandments dwelleth in Him, and He in him. And whereby we know that He abideth in us by the Spirit which He hath given us."

Christianity and the Social
Order

The stability of Christian civilization is being threatened, due largely to the failure of the Christian church to live the gospel which it preaches. Says Christ, "Ye shall know the truth and the truth shall make you free! This means that we should have not only an historical knowledge of truth as it is in Jesus Christ, but should have an experimental knowledge of this truth, which means we should live the truth.

The task of the church is to

Christianize the social order through Christ. The world has been thrown out of gear by sin and corruption of the social order. This situation is due to the fact that the principles of Christianity have been largely left out of the equation of the problems of the world. Too often, no room in the inn is left for Christ. More and more he is left out of the home. The family altar is fast becoming a thing of the past. Christ is being left out of much of the education offered to the youth of our day, and increasing

values. Material values are receiving double emphasis.

Business is often conducted on the principle of getting all you can and canning all you get at any price and method. Christ to a large extent is left out of politics and the governments of states and nations.

Nations should take warning from the Holy scriptures that righteousness exalteth a nation, but sin is a reproach to any people.

America needs a spiritual awakening, a call to repentance. We have become a nation which is laregly worshipping at the shrine of mammon instead of the cross of Christ. The cost of crime in the U.S. last year was around fifteen billion dollars or more than three times the annual cost of maintaining the federal government.

The Christian religion is a thing vital to a Christian's everyday life. In fact, it is a part of the Christian's life.
