



That flowed on Calvary.





All To Christ I Owe.




1 I hear the Saviour say, Thy strength, indeed, is small, Child of weakness, watch and pray: Find in me thine all In all.

- 3 Little children, little children, Who love their Redeemer, Are the jewels, precious jewels, His loved and his own.


It Came Upon the Midnight.




What a Friend.

I am Coming to the Cross.




1 I am coming to the cross; I am poor, and weak, and blind; I am counting all but dross, I shall full salvation find.

Under His Wings.




I In God I have found a retreat, Where I can securely abide; No refuge nor rest so complete, And here I intend to reside,

1 Come to our Father's house, Come, ere the day be gone; Tempests are gath'ring fast, Darkness is coming on.


